

San Franciscan Set (advanced beginner)

Created by Patty Thomas of Daisy Yarns of San Francisco for individual use (not to be copied or published without permission, www.daisy yarns.com), 2008. Updated 11/01/09 back to original instructions using only size 11 needles and bulky yarn.

Materials

3 balls of bulky Yarn (100 gram size ball) - O-Wool Legacy Bulky Yarn (finished scarf size 59 inches x 6 1/2 inches) and (hat is one size fits all) Needles Size 11 straight for scarf plus a stitch counter, stitch markers, plus a yarn needle.

SAN FRANCISCAN SCARF (Needles Size 11):

A. CAST ON 2 stitches place marker, cast on 18 stitches place marker, cast on 2 stitches = 22 Total Stitches

Row 1: Knit across the row (you should have 22 stitches total)

Row 2: Knit 2 for border, *Knit 2 stitches TOG (together)* till the last 2 stitches, Knit 2 for border (You should see 2 knitted stitches + 9 knitted stitches inside the borders + 2 knitted stitches)

Row 3: Knit 2 for border, *Knit 1, Make 1 stitch (see below for how to make 1 stitch)* till the last 2 stitches, Knit 2 for the border. (You should see 2 knitted stitches + 18 stitches inside the borders + 2 knitted stitches) = 22 Stitches

Repeat Rows 1-3 using a stitch counter on your needle to ensure pattern accuracy. STOP WHEN SCARF IS 47 INCHES, bind off on a Knit Row! Be careful not to go beyond 47 inches so that you have enough yarn for the hat.

B. FRINGE

Cut 44 strips of 11 inches of yarn (use a ruler). Either using a yarn needle or a crochet hook attach 24 strips evenly placed to both the ends of the scarf making a knotted loop in the middle of the 11 inch strip of yarn. After completion, lay scarf flat and trim both ends of fringe with scissors

How To Make 1 Stitch (M1):

Make a stitch by looking at the needle or your right side, then your left side. See the loop between the two stitch. Put your left needle under this loop, pull it up and knit it. This increase will make a slight hole which is part of the pattern. This is not the same as a yarn over. There are several ways to make a stitch, please use this method and not the invisible method.

SAN FRANCISCAN HAT (Needles Size 11 Straight):

A. CAST ON 64 stitches, place markers every 10 stitches, except for the last 4 (the markers will help you keep accurate count with the Yarn Overs)

B. HAT BORDER Row 1: Knit 2, Purl 2 across the row Row 2: Purl 2, Knit 2 across the row Row 3: Knit 2, Purl 2 across the row

C. HAT BODY

Row 1: *Knit 2 Together, Yarn Over (to make YO see bottom of page)* repeat *until the end of the row. Note your last stitch is a Yarn Over (looks floppy until next row) and you will knit into the back of this stitch.

Row 2: Purl first stitch (which is the yarn over) through the back loop and purl the remaining stitches normally to the end of the row.

Row 3: *Knit 2 Together, Yarn Over (to make YO see bottom of page)* repeat *until the end of the row. Note your last stitch is a Yarn Over (looks floppy until next row).

Row 4: Purl first stitch (which is the yarn over) through the back loop and purl the remaining stitches normally to the end of the row.

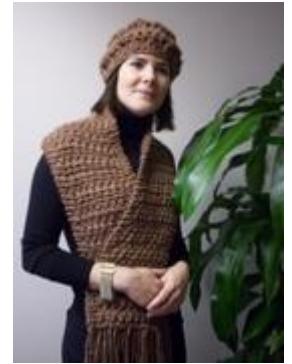
Row 5: Purl entire row

Row 6: Knit entire row

Row 7: Purl entire row

Row 8: Knit entire row

Row 9: Purl entire row



Row 10: Knit entire row

Row 11: *Knit 2 Together, Yarn Over (to make YO see bottom of page)* repeat *until the end of the row. Note your last stitch is a Yarn Over (looks floppy until next row).

Row 12: Purl first stitch (which is the yarn over) through the back loop and purl the remaining stitches normally to the end of the row.

Row 13: *Knit 2 Together, Yarn Over (to make YO see bottom of page)* repeat *until the end of the row. Note your last stitch is a Yarn Over (looks floppy until next row).

Row 14: Purl first stitch (which is the yarn over) through the back loop and purl the remaining stitches normally to the end of the row.

Row 15: Purl entire row

Row 16: Knit entire row

Row 17: Start Purl DECREASE row. *Purl 2 together (TOG) 3 times and 1 Yarn Over* *Repeat till last stitch, Purl 1

Row 18: Purl entire row

Row 19: Knit 2 TOG across entire row

Row 20: Purl entire row

Row 21: Knit 2 TOG entire row

Row 22: Purl 2 TOG, Purl 1, Purl 2 TOG across entire row. There should be 7 stitches left

Row 23: Knit 2 TOG, Knit 3, K 2 TOG entire row. There should now be 5 stitches left

D. FINISHING Leave 20 inches of yarn and cut! Thread a yarn needle on the remaining yarn and run through the last stitches to secure them and tighten up. Fold hat in half with the purl rows on the outside, pin & match to pattern. Using your yarn needle, sew sides together starting just under the first row (sewing the sides of the seams and NOT stitching over the top of the seam). I personally like to go over the seam again that's why I left a 20 inches. Weave in any loose ends (ie from the cast on start).

How To Do Yarn Over Stitch (YO):

When you knit the yarn is in the back, when you do a Yarn Over...YOU PULL THE YARN FROM THE BACK TO THE FRONT & continue knitting, it looks like a half stitch! Plastic markers are important to ensure the stitch count remains consistent with Yarn Overs. This is not the same as a Make 1 Stitch and makes a slightly different look.
